Cradle to Cradle Certified sets requirements in five key performance categories: Material Health, Material Reutilization, Renewable Energy and Carbon Management, Water Stewardship, and Social Fairness. The Cradle to Cradle Certified Product Standard also requires a product manufacturer to continuously improve the certified product's environmental properties and its manufacturing/production process over time in order to remain certified in the program.
2) Label requirements are based on objectively verifiable and non-discriminatory criteria,	Yes, the Cradle to Cradle Certified Product Standard criteria are written in clear and precise language, and the criteria are objective and verifiable. The criteria do not discriminate, as all products that are within scope of the standard and meet the requirements may be awarded certification irrespective of the company or its location. The Cradle to Cradle Certified Product Standard criteria and associated assessment methodologies, as well as program policies are publicly available on the Cradle to Cradle Products Innovation Institute (C2CPII) website (c2ccertified.org). Evaluation and verification that standard requirements have been met is done by C2CPII, the certification body for the Cradle to Cradle Certified Products Program, in partnership with a global network of accredited assessment bodies.
